Situation Overview

Significant severe weather event likely later today and into Thursday

•Round 1: This afternoon

- Scattered severe storms moving into the Florida Panhandle and SE Alabama
- Squall line and individual severe thunderstorms
- Round 2: Intense and powerful squall line will move through the region tonight and into Thursday
- This will potentially be more intense than Round 1, though the line may weaken while approaching I-75.
- Do not focus as much on the thunderstorm risk level. There is little to no difference in our expected impacts between a "Hatched Enhanced Risk" and a "Moderate Risk" This is as serious severe weather situation, especially in our Western Counties.

All severe hazards possible:

- * Damaging to Destructive winds of 60-75 mph.
- * Several tornadoes (some could strong of EF-2 intensity or greater, especially in our western areas)
- * Hail.

Other hazards:

- * Non thunderstorm gusts of 35-45 mph ahead of the squall line overnight.
- * Considerable Flash Flooding, especially across the central and western portions of the region.
- * Minor to moderate coastal flooding in Apalachee Bay

Impacts:


*Numerous to widespread power outages, structural damage (some significant), beach erosion, minor river flooding.





Severe Weather Outlook until Daybreak Thursday

Today through Daybreak Thursday



What:

- •Scattered severe storms in the Florida Panhandle and SE Alabama in round 1.
- •Squall line later tonight through the entire region.
- •Enhanced Risk (level 3 of 5) indicates greatest risk for impacts.

When:

- Late this afternoon through Thursday morning.
- •Hazards:
- •60 to 75 mph thunderstorm wind gusts
- •Several tornadoes some strong.
- •Hail up to 1 inch possible.








Severe Weather Outlook Thursday after Daybreak

After Daybreak Thursday



What:

•Widespread, squall line, may be weakening nearing I-75

When:

• From daybreak until late afternoon across the region.

•Hazards:

- •60 to 70 mph damaging thunderstorm wind gusts
- A few tornadoes
- •Hail up to 1 inch possible.



Second Round - Intense Squall Line Arrival Times


Wednesday evening into Thursday morning







Average Rainfall Amounts




Isolated heavier amounts are expected. Flash flooding is a considerable concern, especially in the FL Panhandle, SE Alabama and Southwest Georgia.

Flood Watch - Starting Late Tonight








Non-Thunderstorm Sustained Winds and Gusts

Late Tonight and into Thursday







Coastal Flood Threat

Late Monday night through Tuesda What:

Flood Category Aucilla River No Flooding 1-2 ft AGL 2-4 ft AGL Limited Flooding Carrabelle Minor Flooding 2-4 ft AGL **Moderate Flooding** Does not depict inland Suwannee **Major Flooding** River extent of storm surge

- Minor flooding along the Emerald Coast through Carrabelle
- Potentially moderate flooding east of Carrabelle across coastal Apalachee Bay

When:

 Early Thursday morning through Thursday Afternoon

Note: peak water levels will occur around the time of high tide early Thursday morning and again Thursday afternoon – more so in in Taylor and Dixie County.

We'll be looking at whether coastal flood advisories or warnings are needed later this afternoon.







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Impacts:

*Numerous to widespread power outages, structural damage (some significant), beach erosion, minor river flooding.
